The 19th Camp Villages summer program runs through Aug. 9.

Thursday's event was put on by The Villages Motor Racing Fan Club.

Club members assisted the grandchildren with their cars and made the atmosphere feel like attendees were participating in a real NASCAR event. One club member acted as a sports announcer and provided commentary during the races, while another waved a checkered flag whenever someone finished a race.

The club has been hosting the Camp Villages event for the past several years.

They enjoy sharing their interest in model cars with the younger generation, said club member Bob Woodsford.

"It was fun," he said. "I would come back next year."
