"The 43 cars going by at 100-something (mph) is my thing," Touchette said. "Just that sound; it's just awesome."


"Once you hear that live, you don't want to watch it on TV, you can't turn up your surround-sound loud enough."



On the bus ride down, the group talked about odds of collecting autographs from some of their favorite racers in the Fan Zone, in addition to some friendly trash talking as they discussed which driver would win the race.
