## World Series Report—New Smyrna Speedway

New Smyrna Speedway's version of Speedweeks—officially known as the “World Series of Short Track Racing”—featured nine straight days of intense competition at this imposing half-mile concrete oval. It also featured solid appearances by Wildwood's famed Anderson family. Competing in the series' premier Super Late Model class, the Andersons made their presence known repeatedly throughout the grueling nine-day schedule, taking on the strong competition offered by a field of Central Florida standouts like eventual World Series champion David Rogers, Tim Russell, and Jeremy Colangelo, along with former Floridian and now North Carolinian Jeff Choquette, 2007 ASA Late Model Series Champion.

Wayne Anderson turned in the most consistent performance for the Sumter County contingent, compiling a finishing average of 4<sup>th</sup> in the eight Super Late Model features. His results included third place finishes in the first four features and a commanding win in the seventh race, with a lowest finish of 8<sup>th</sup>. As a contender in every event, Anderson's black number 84 provided a constant measure of pressure for the rest of the field.

Although not experiencing as strong a performance as his son, family patriarch Dick Anderson (a.k.a. “The King of the Florida Short Tracks”) also turned in a solid run during the World Series. His two entries—the No. 84x driven by Mt. Dora's Matt Bowers and the legendary No. 92 driven by NASCAR Nationwide series driver Cale Gale—also made their

presence known during the nine-day stretch. Gale posted an average finish of 7<sup>th</sup> for the two events he ran, while up-and-coming young star Bowers compiled an average 9<sup>th</sup> place finish for the four features in which he competed.

So, with all three Anderson cars averaging finishes in the top ten, it was a respectful World Series for the Wildwood delegation. The elder Anderson approached the series as a shakedown session for his recently re-built No. 92 entry, and as a training and experience

session for his 17 year old protégé, Bowers. But Dick is a proven winner, and the absence of a win for either of his cars left him, in his words, “Totally frustrated.” Bowers was a bit more philosophical about the experience, calling it “An enlightening week for all of us, with a lot of struggles and ups and downs.”

As our club knows, Dick Anderson may be frustrated right now, but he will be back in the Winner's Circle in no time!

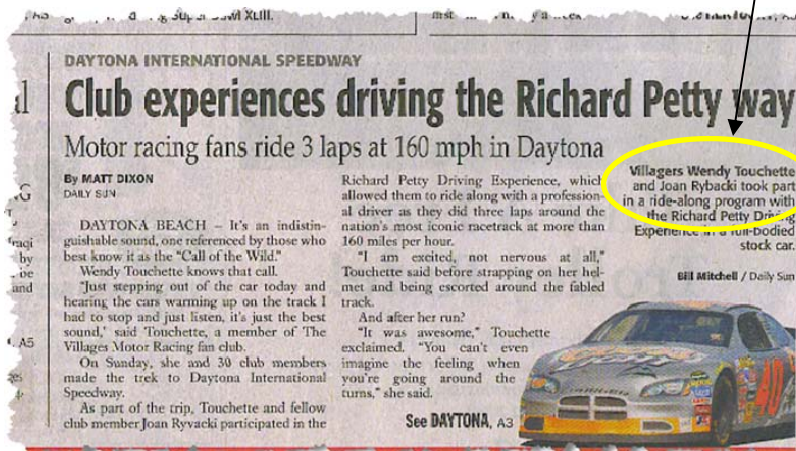

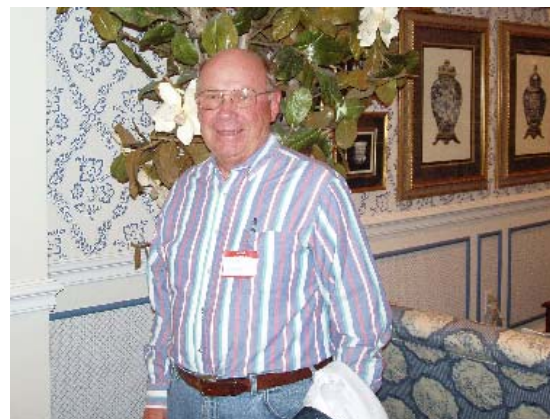

## ***Buster Rides Again...50 Years Later!***

Those of you who were able to join us over at Daytona on February 1 witnessed a piece of history...Buster Burt strapping into a race car and heading out on the famous Speedway fifty years to the month after he competed in the track's first NASCAR event. Here's the story...

In February of 1959, Villages resident Arthur (Buster) Burt entered the Modified/Sportsman series race at Daytona International Speedway. It was the first event on the brand new super speedway, and Buster made history along with 99 fellow drivers as they took the green to inaugurate the spectacular "world center of speed." A six-year veteran of local stock car venues at the time, Buster had built an impressive set of credentials as a quiet, methodical competitor who could get the job done. His credentials included regular competition on the Speedway's predecessor track—the four mile combination beach/road course at Daytona—and weekly combat on short tracks like Orlando, Lakeland, and Eau Gallie. A frequent winner, Buster came to be known as one of the sports true gentlemen and a pioneer of the early days of stock car racing in Florida and his home state of Maine.

Later in life, Buster re-emerged as a Legends-series driver in Maine, New Hampshire, and Vermont, eventually being named NASCAR Legend Car Director in 1996. As evidenced by his two-year stint as a show-car specialist for Roush Racing on the NASCAR Cup circuit, he kept his hand and his heart in racing at many levels, and was named to the Maine Motorsports Hall of Fame in 2006. After a 55+ year love affair with motorsports, Buster stepped out of that world and into the world of retirement, moving to Florida and then to The Villages in 2003. He thought he'd put the roar of the stock car behind him. He was wrong.



In 2006, at the suggestion of a friend, Buster joined The Villages Motor Racing Fan Club, and quickly proved that "once a racer, always a racer." With his blood once again boiling, he began to take field trips with the club to local tracks, often fighting the urge to jump in a race car and take off. Then, late last year, Buster won first place in a club raffle—a ticket to join the Richard Petty Driving Experience at—where else—Daytona International Speedway. After pondering his options—tear up the ticket, give it away, forget about it, or use it—his love of motorsports got the best of him and he scheduled his return trip to the Speedway for February 1, 2009...fifty years to the month after last setting foot on the track!

So, on February 1, at the tender age of 79 (very soon to be 80), Buster, accompanied by 30 fellow club members and supporters, made the trip. In the pre-event training session, officials commemorated the history-making event, with Buster basking in an ovation from fellow participants and spectators. His support group added to the excitement with cheers as he took to the track, and afterward presented him with a plaque memorializing the day.

It was a great day for everyone involved, and clear proof the blood of a racer is always high octane!

## Website Review NASCAR on ESPN

Here's a website that's often overlooked in our quest for relevant racing information. Whether or not you enjoy the racing coverage ESPN provides, it's fair to say their website offers an interesting array of background information on Cup-, Nationwide-, and Camping World Truck-series racing. To get to the site, you can Google "ESPN Nascar", or use this URL: <http://sports.espn.go.com/rpm/nascar/index>.

Once you get there, you'll find a variety of headline articles, editorial opinions, statistics, current standings, schedules, polls, blogs, and media links...in short, just about everything you might want. Their NASCAR NOW item also provides advance notice of upcoming broadcasts featuring topics of interest to racing fans. In case you get overwhelmed reading about NASCAR while on the site, there are convenient links to virtually any of the other lesser sports (like NFL, NBA, etc.) Of course, the site gives you the opportunity to buy stuff but, then, what website doesn't?

Anyway, it's a pretty good site for balanced reporting on NASCAR and it's players. Give it a look-see!

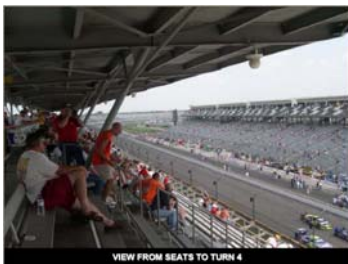
## *Classified Ads*

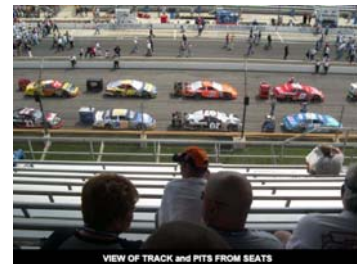
