Another Visit From Racing Royalty!



June 6—It was another night of great racing stories, this time led by none other than Wayne Reutimann Sr., Buzzie's kid brother and a highly acclaimed and accomplished veteran of stock car and sprint car racing in Florida and up and down the country's east coast. Wayne took us on a nostalgic tour of some of the days gone by in racing, from his career in Florida to the dirt tracks of the northeast, sharing a host of amusing tales of life in the "old days" of racing and especially life competing with (and against) his older brother.

Wayne Reutimann Sr. addresses the club June 6 For those of you who may not be aware, Wayne Reutimann has compiled a truly remarkable career in racing, achieving legend status and helping to keep

the mystique of the Reutimann name in the forefront of racing history. For example, he's a two-time winner of the Florida Governor's Cup and he's captured a win in the 1979 running of the prestigious "Little 500" event at Anderson (Ind.) Speedway. Locally, he's a former Florida State Late Model Champion, and he's recorded 96 feature wins competing in the Tampa Bay Area Racing Association (TBARA) sprint car series.

One of the fascinating stories Wayne entertained us with dealt with the "Little 500" win...it seems he actually won the race while in the hospital being treated for injuries suffered during the closing stages of the event. Wayne had built a large enough lead that the crew was able to put the car back together and get a relief driver (Danny Smith) to finish, while Wayne was transported to the hospital for treatment. Smith maintained the lead when the race resumed, winning over the two other cars on the lead lap (one of which was Dave Scarborough of Brooksville, FL, another Florida racing standout).

Brother Buzzie opened the Reutimann segment of the meeting with a recap of David's upcoming stint in the James Finch No. 51 in "relief" of Kurt Busch, and then introduced Wayne Sr. He also observed that, since there was likely to be a serious round of story-telling ahead, he and Wayne had elected to bring their younger sister Joy along to help keep the record straight! Later in the meeting, Joy discussed her own racing career, which featured a stint driving "powder puff" events in local female racing circuits. She even confessed to having accomplished a few roll-over accidents during her time on the track.



Jerry Conkle Takes 2012 Prediction Row Segment 1

June 3-Known around the club as our resident Indy/Open Wheel expert, Jerry Conkle proved he has some insight into what goes on in the NASCAR ranks as well. Out of the 13 segment one predictions Conkle made, seven wound up in the top 5 (along with one win), while only 4 were outside the top 10. As a result, he finished a whopping 31 points ahead of Fred Coenen and topthree newcomer Bob Giles. Conkle, Coenen, and Giles now take a break to rest up for the Chase segment, while the second segment predictors sharpen their pencils for races 14-26.

Overall the segment one group performed admirably, with six winning predictions (7.6%) and 25 top-five predictions out of a possible 78 (32.1%). In fact, over 50% of the segment one predictions came home in the top 10 finishing order.

The final rundown for segment one looked like this:

The segment two predictors are also off and running, having (as of this writing) moved through the first 3 races of their portion of the competition. Rookie Jon Neville and veteran Connie Scalzitti share the top spot on the leader board, a mere two points ahead of rookie Wayne Nolan. Defending Champion Al Stone has begun to build momentum, and sits 13 points back from the lead. Meanwhile, rookies Corky Eck and Matt Patterson slug it out for fifth and sixth, respectively. But then, it's still early in the race!


Randy also competes in CCS's Open Wheel Modified series, although not regularly. He's recorded one feature win and one heat win in this series, currently standing 19th in the points race.

Corey LaJoie Shines in K&N East Racing

June 23—Many of you will recognize the last name, since his father is none other than Randy LaJoie, two time NASCAR Busch Grand National series Champion. You may also have recognized the name as being associated with NASCAR safety advocacy and the manufacture of custom-designed seats for many of the more prestigious, safety-conscious race teams. But what you may not know is that there is a direct connection between the LaJoies and our club: Randy LaJoie's wife Lisa—Corey's mother—is the daughter of club member **Ernie Battee**. If you're good with genealogy, then, you know that Corey Lajoie is Ernie's grandson. And, like most grandparents, Ernie's real proud!

Twenty year-old Corey is a 15-year racing veteran, having started in go-karts at age five, then moving to Bandoleros, Legend Cars, and the Aaron's Pro Challenge Series (where he won 10 of the 12 races he entered). In 2007, he stepped up to the UARA-Stars Late Model Touring Series, where he complied an impressive record of one win (Rockingham), five top fives, and 10 top tens in 17 races between 2007 and 2009.

Now competing in the K&N East Series, Corey has begun to make a name for himself at the higher levels of motorsports. The K&N se-

ries is regarded by many to be the last step before entering the rare air of the NAS-CAR Nationwide se-

ries. On June 2, he recorded a breakthrough win at Bowman Gray Stadium and then became the series' first repeat winner with a win at Langley (VA) Speedway. The win moved him to just one point shy of series leader Chase Elliott, halfway through the 2012 schedule.

The next K&N East race is Saturday, July 14 at CNB Bank Raceway Park in Clearfield, PA. A replay of Corey's win at Langley will be broadcast on the Speed channel Thursday, June 28 at 3:00 pm. I expect Ernie will be watching!
