Old Racers Never Die, and They Don't Fade Away, Either!



November 4–With a racing career that has spanned six decades, Club member Art "Fireball" Fehrman is the embodiment of what racing is all about. With a record that started in 1968 with Rookie of the Year honors at Santa Fe Speedway in Illinois, Art went on to compile an incredible racing resume at many tracks in the Midwest. He recounted the beginning of his racing interest as an understudy to his dad, and in fact, reports that he got his start in a Quarter Midget through a deal his dad put together for intermission events at Mance Park, and star was born!

Art shared the history of Sante Fe Speedway, from it's 1953 opening to its close in 1995, noting that one of its unique characteristics was its half mile configuration with a quarter mile track inside. He reported that Santa Fe was one of the first tracks to bring in the big names of NASCAR, like Bobby Allison, David Pearson, and Buddy Baker, a step that back in the day was an innovative thing for promoters to do.

During a stint in the U.S. Air Force, Art continued to race while stationed at Grissom Air Force base in Indiana. He was able to conduct a pretty ambitious racing schedule, racing Friday, Saturday, and Sunday throughout 1969. Then, after being deployed oversees for a year and a half, he returned to Grissom and resumed his racing career with a vengeance. He won 8 features at Santa Fe in 1971 and 10 in 1972, driving for many car owners and putting together

an incredible history of on-track performance, at one stretch finishing top five 17 times in a row.

Art took a break from racing in the early 1990s, and in 2004 came back to the track in a modified entry at Crown Point Speedway. After three not-so-good experiences, he decided to focus his attention on Vintage Racing, founding the Illinois Vintage Racing series.

Art served as President of Illinois Vintage Racing from 2006 to 2015, and is respected for growing the organization to its present state. In 2014, for example, the series ran 12 events, with car counts as high as 24 and a following that rivals similar organiza-

tions across the country. It's been a labor of love for Art, enabling him to stay active in a sport he loves, and it also afforded him an opportunity to experience two of his "bucket list"



items...driving at the "Milwaukee Mile" in 2007 and Darlington Raceway in 2009. With financial support from Tibor Machine Products, the series has continued to prosper and has achieved substantial acclaim in motorsports circles.



Clearly, Art is one of those guys that can't say no, and in 2009 he took on the task of forming the Illinois Stock Car Racing Hall of Fame, another venture that has reached prominence under Art's leadership. Since its formation, the Hall has inducted 40 tremendous names in the world of stock car racing, including Fred Lorenzen, Andy Granatelli, Russ Wallace, Hugh Deery, and "Tiger" Tom Pistone, to name just a few. The organization is housed in the Historic Auto Attractions facility in Roscoe, Illinois.

Art ended his discussion by introducing Jim O'Connor, current owner of Kokomo Speedway and a fellow racing veteran with a 42-year racing resume. Jim is recognized for his expertise as a promoter, but also as a nine-time champion and all-time leader in feature wins (88) at Kankakee Speedway. Jim is a 2013 inductee in the Illinois Stock Car Hall of Fame, and his career was profiled in an article published in the

Kankakee Valley Daily-Journal. Here's an excerpt from that article: "With more than twice as many feature wins as any other driver ever to compete at the Kankakee County Fairgrounds dirt track, O'Connor easily was the most dominant driver here. And hall of fame voters across the state recognized that talent."

Jim and Art closed out the presentation with a discussion on how Jim got into track ownership and pro-

motion, first at Kankakee and then at Crown Point and Kokomo. At the urging of his son, Jim accepted an invitation from the Kankakee Fairgrounds board to take over track operations, which subsequently led to a complete redesign of the racing surface. After fulfilling his five-year contract, he focused on Crown Point Speedway that he had purchased while promoting Kankakee. He subsequently took over operations at Kokomo, operating the facility for a former car owner and rebuilding the facility as he had done at both Kankakee and Crown Point.

Jim and his family (wife and eight children, all of whom are involved) ran the two tracks for awhile, eventually selling Crown Point and focusing on Kokomo. They've now operated Kokomo for 11 years, and the track is doing well.

Based on the feedback we've received, it's clear that we'll need to bring Jim back for an encore presentation sometime in 2016.




2015 Governor's Cup 200 Weekend

November 20—The weather was perfect, the racing was superb, the scoreboard was working, and the Governor was there...what more could you ask for on a late-fall **Sunday** afternoon? A handful of club members made it over to New Smyrna Speedway on November 14th & 15th for the 2015 edition of Governor's Cup weekend, and it was a blast. In the Saturday night event for Open Wheel Modifieds, we witnessed Josh Todd in Dick Anderson's No. 7 ("our car") put on a clinic for the 25-car field, qualifying 3rd, starting 6th, and taking (and keeping) the lead on lap 4, bagging the \$7,500 winner's purse. Returning on Sunday for the Super Late Model race for the Governor's Cup, we saw an incredible field of 40 cars slug it out (only 12 were left standing at the end) for the trophy and \$15,000. Wisconsin's Ty Majeski, a 20-year old star who's blazing a path to future stardom, took the honors with a dominant performance.

Ricky Anderson—A Third-Generation Champion



On October 31, the 15-year old racer from Wildwood put his name in Citrus County's record books as the 2015 Super Late Model Champion, logging two feature wins in the five-race season and compiling a 31-point margin over second place Jonathan Appleby. Anderson's two wins came back-to-back earlier in the month, following runner-up finishes in the first two races in the series. His average finishing position (1.6) far outpaced any of the regular challengers in the field of 23 drivers.

Ricky, of course, is the son of Florida standout driver and former NASCAR competitor Wayne Anderson, and grandson of legendary short track driver and club godfather Dick Anderson (a.k.a. "King of the Florida Short Tracks"). Randy Anderson, Ricky's brother, also competed sporadically in the Super Late Model ranks this year at Citrus County Speedway, finishing 10th in the points standings. Wayne Anderson competed once in 2015, bag-

ging a win in the season opener and finishing 12th in the final points standings.

With a substantial points lead going in to the final race, Ricky realized he'd only need to start the event to clinch the championship. Dropping to the back and just staying out of trouble is what some drivers might have done, but Ricky's an Anderson, and Andersons compete. So, from his sixth starting position, he moved up to second place by lap 3 of the 25-lap event, and mounted several strong challenges to overtake leader and eventual winner Tommy Schnader, falling short by half a car length. Brother Randy was also in the hunt throughout the event, finishing a close third.

Prior to the race, parental pride was evident in the Anderson pit, although mom Laurie Anderson revealed that she still has some nervousness when the green flag drops. "He is my youngest," she pointed out, "and you always worry about the baby." Dad was more level about it, reporting that Ricky's driving skills are developing well as a result of the experience he's acquired on the short tracks, especially the 3/8th mile Citrus County Speedway track. "It's a bull ring," Wayne said, "and stuff happens fast here. It's a better way to build reflexes and instincts than on the bigger tracks."
